NEIGHBORHOOD PARKS

Neighborhood parks feature some of our hidden treasures. Check out these parks in your own "backyard"

EARLEWOOD PARK (1113 Recreation Drive) features a Community Center, amphitheater, one-of-a-kind playground, 2 youth & 1 adult lighted softball/baseball/kickball fields, basketball courts, 2 lighted tennis courts, and Columbia's first 18-hole disc golf course that was established in 1991.

Earlewood Park is also home to the NoMa Bark Park, a two-acre offleash dog park located along North Main Street. Amenities include resting benches, water fountains, shade trees and convenient petwaste disposal stations - as well as separate small dog and large dog play areas. Membership is \$25/dog/year. 

Considering Remodeling your Earlewood Home?

This is what you need to know before you make exterior improvements in Historic Earlewood:

Earlewood, designated as a Historic District local Protection Area in 2005, has its own unique set of design guidelines. Exterior changes such as additions, demolition, and fences and driveways must be approved by the Design/Development Review Commission (D/DRC). The Earlewood Neighborhood was developed after 1900 and illustrates the development of an early Columbia neighborhood from the time of great suburban expansion in the early twentieth century through the housing boom of the post-World War II period. Historic Earlewood is divided into two areas: Area A where many of the historic structures were built between 1910-1945 and Area B where development occurred between 1940-1955. If you are considering major renovations to your home, you may be able to benefit from the Bailey Bill, a historic properties tax abatement program. The Bailey Bill allows local governments to grant property tax abatement to encourage rehabilitation of historic properties. The City of Columbia adopted the Bailey Bill in 2007. The main feature of the Bailey Bill is that property owners, who invest at least 20% of the fair market value of the structure, do not have to pay taxes on the increased value of their property for the next 20 years.
